A Brief History of Toastmasters

1924 – Ralph Smedley holds the first meeting of the Number One Toastmasters club in Santa Ana, California

1928 - First *Manual for Toastmasters Clubs* published.

1933 - First issue of *The Toastmaster* magazine published

1936 – Southport becomes the first UK club to be given charter.

1937 – Glasgow Toastmasters Club receives charter

1938 - First inter-club speech contest held

1946 – Scotland becomes first district (18) outside of the United States

1969 - *Communication and Leadership Manual* introduced

1972 – 25 clubs in United Kingdom form District 71

1982 - October, worldwide membership reaches 100,000

1993 – Number of clubs worldwide reaches 8,000

2001 – UK clubs total 100 with 2,500 members

2001 – Number of clubs worldwide reaches 8,600

2001 – Worldwide membership reaches 180,000

2004 – Number of clubs worldwide reaches 10,000

2006 – *Competent Leadership* manual introduced

What Is Toastmasters?

Toastmasters is an international organisation which supports local clubs to help their members learn by speaking to groups and working in a supportive environment.

A typical Toastmasters club may be made up of 20 to 30 people who meet on a regular basis for a few hours.

Club meetings gives members the opportunity to:

- Give impromptu speeches
- Present prepared speeches
- Conduct meetings
- Receive constructive feedback

Through participation in the Toastmasters program, people from all backgrounds learn to effectively speak, conduct meetings, manage a department or business, lead, delegate and motivate

Toastmasters Educational Program

The Toastmasters educational program is divided into two tracks: a communication track and a leadership track.

Each track consists of a series of manuals, with each manual containing a series of projects which members work through.

The tracks are not mutually exclusive; you can participate in both tracks at the same time if you wish.

Communication Track

Members working in this track learn and practice communication skills.

Leadership Track

Members working in this track learn and practice leadership skills by serving in club roles.

Speechcraft

Speechcraft is a program designed to help you or your staff learn public speaking skills during four, six or eight one to two hour sessions.

During each session attendees will learn and practice speaking and evaluation skills, and will have the opportunity to learn from experienced speakers.
